## Coronavirus Life

Well, COVID19 came closer to us than ever before. My daughter started at a new school on Tuesday September 1<sup>st</sup> and although they sit in regular class sizes, whilst in the school they have to wear a mask. By Thursday the 3<sup>rd</sup> we got the email that somebody in her class had tested positive. Full marks to the system though. She had to self-isolate and by 10am the following morning we were given the code for a test appointment by the Hygienic Office. One after 3 days and a second a week later. Both negative fortunately. The problem seems to be with the teachers because of 42 teachers in the school already 12 are either in quarantine or isolation.

With the number of daily infections rising from 200-300 last month up to 2000+ this month, the country has increased it's protection level so it's back to wearing masks inside buildings but it's nowhere near the lockdown we had in March. The Health Minister resigned last week and was replaced by an epidemiologist. Looks great on paper but personally I think a good manager should be in overall charge of health. I'm not expecting an epidemiologist to be getting involved in budgets and all the day-to-day health service issues so I wonder who will do that part. Seems to me like a "we want you in the tent pi\*\*ing out" sort of political move.

## In The News

The Jindrich Chalupecky prize is awarded to a visual artist aged under 35. However this year there will not be an overall winner. The finalists agreed that they were against the concept of artistic competition and hoped all would benefit from the publicity.

The Czech government reacted vocally when the Belarus President Lukashenko accused Czechs of organising protests in his country. Troops in armoured vans, violence against protestors, secret police lifting political opponents off the street. Sound like 1950s Prague.

A guy walking his dog in a west-Bohemian forest stumbled across some coins dug out of the ground by wild pigs. It turned out to be hundreds of gold and silver coins dating back to 1300.

In mid-March when Covid-19 cases were at 1000+ per day we went into quarantine i.e. everything shut except chemists and supermarkets. In late September we are at nearly 3000 cases per day yet, no big response. Why? It's the economy stupid!!

Our Premier Babiš had some more legal difficulties. Having not quite separated himself from various companies he was accused even by the EU Commission of being in a conflict of interest. A lower Regional Court found he was not in a conflict of interest. The Supreme State Attorney said that judgement was incorrect, but failed to issue his own judgement on the matter.

The government continues to argue about income tax levels. It's accepted that the rate is based on the % of a person's gross annual salary plus whatever they had to pay in health insurance and pension. There's a move to abolish that method and make the income tax rate flat at 15%. It where the money will come from to support that new rate that they are arguing about.

## **Trivia and Odd Statistics**

Per Capita, Czechs waste 4.5Kg of food per year but if you looked only at cities that figure rises to 37.4Kg heading to landfill.

15 Czech Border Collie dogs competed in the 2020 European Sheep Herding Championship.

In July 2020 there were 135 accidents on Czech Railways property, 28 people died and 55 were injured.

The Czech Fire Service sent 37 search and rescue experts to Beirut following the explosion.

Tick-borne encephalitis (Lyme disease) cases in 2020 rose by 25% (366) over the same period last year (297). 29% of Czechs are vaccinated against Lyme disease.

July 2020 was the coldest since 2012 with a top temperature 26.8 Celsius.

Police detained 5,677 illegal immigrants in 2020 (mostly Ukrainian and Vietnamese) which was 685 more than the same period in 2019.

South African MotoGP rider Brad Binder won the Czech Grand Prix in Brno covering 22 laps in 41 minutes and 38 seconds.

The metro station at Karlovo Náměsti (Charles Square) will have the deepest lift shaft on the network at 40 metres when finished.

It's official, tour guides in the country lost 90% of their work in the spring and summer of 2020. For me personally it was more like 98%.

The number of foreigners in the country with temporary or permanent residence status is 595,881, up 5.1% on last year.

Since 2018 the number of Czech people offering foster care services to homeless or orphaned children dropped by 66%.

## **Walking Tours**
