Coronavirus Life

Is that some light at the end of a particularly long tunnel? I'm optimistic even though as I write this we are at the second highest level of lockdown and it's clear that there'll be a price to pay for the mixing over Christmas and New Year.

We'll know more in the next month regarding vaccinations but as I am writing this the UK just allowed the Oxford-AstraZeneca vaccine to be used in the UK and the Czechs have reserved 9 million doses of that one.

Historically January is the month when leasing and rental contracts come up for renewal so it's not uncommon to see businesses choosing this coming month to decide if they want to commit to another year. We'll know by February what has survived.

Brexit

For Brits travelling to Czech there are some things to note:

- Passports: not older than 10 years and with 6 months validity.
- A Visa may be required if you intend staying longer than 90 days, for study or for work.
- At the airport border you'll be using the "All Passports" route.
- If driving, then if you are resident in mainland UK then there are no new driving restrictions on your route to the Czech Republic but if your licence was issued in the Isle of Man, Jersey, Guernsey etc then you may need the IDP (International Driving Permit) and it's the 1968 version check the link at https://www.gov.uk/driving-abroad/get-an-idp and contact the relevant embassies on your route.
- Your Duty Free will be cheaper.

In The News

Construction of Prague's fourth metro line is due to begin this spring.

Discussions continue on whether to end "Guaranteed Salary" i.e. setting a minimum payment rate based on educational level. The Communist Party wants to keep it so that seems like a damn good reason to bin it.

A Czech family was arrested in Austria for failing to declare the correct worth of imported goods. The declaration was for 4000 Euros but the 800 bars of silver and gold found in the car were estimated to be worth closer to 700,000 Euros.

The flooding of a former mine created the largest pit lake in the country with a surface area of 300 hectares. The new Lake Most cost CZK2.5 Billion and took 12 years to complete.

A voting poll by Kantar suggested that if a general election were held then the Communist Party would receive 4.5% of the vote. This is less than the minimum 5% required to be allocated seats in Parliament and would be the first time since 1918 (except WW2) that the Communist Party was not in either government or opposition. In the regional elections they failed to win any Senate seats and their regional assembly seats reduced from 86 to 13.

A post-1989 prosecution of three top Communist officials has finally been halted after one died and the other two were deemed mentally incapacitated.

The country is providing protection and treatment for 50 Belarusians mostly aged between 20 and 30 whose physical injuries include broken bones, gunshot wounds, eye/ear damage caused by explosion, and torture.

Trivia and Odd Statistics

Every 186th person in the country is named Václav (Wenceslas).

620,000 Chinese citizens visited the Czech Republic in 2019.

The Czech Parliament passed legislation in a move to ban the farming of chickens in cages by 2027.

In August 2019 banks granted 6,868 mortgage loans worth CZK19.2 Billion.

80% of respondents in a public opinion poll said that they would stay in their current job even though they felt they were being underpaid for the position.

A Labour Ministry audit found that 98,300 Czechs who are entitled to a pension, collect that pension in another country.

2.9 Million Czechs have an Instagram account, up 20% on 2019. The most followed person is Peter Čech, former goalkeeper.

The 1926 painting called "La Dame de pique" by Marie Čermínova (known as Toyen) sold for CZK78.65 Million, a Czech record.

1,493 personal bankruptcies were declared in September 2020.

The government announced that February 4th would be the "Day of Czechs Abroad".

A Czech online grocer and a mineral water company have teamed up to develop the first refundable canned product.

Healthcare workers received CZK11.5 Billion in bonuses in 2020 and will receive a general 10% wage increase in 2021.

For protection against COVID-19 a study found that 62% of people in Czech use a textile mask, 27% use a surgical mask, 6% use a respirator and 2% use nothing.

Walking Tours

Due to the current National Lockdown, no tours will be possible until at least Monday, January 10th 2021.

I'll be 55 in 2021 and I'm actually feeling more optimistic than I have been for some months. With the confidence of the vaccination programs in various countries I'm hoping that May 2021 will see me breaking even. Yes, that is five months from now and things can change. At the start of 2021, Trip Advisor is showing 879 walking tour options in Prague (I'm 23rd on that list). I wonder how many are still going!

Activity Spotlight! - Indoor Skydiving

Although it can't give you the thrill of jumping out of a plane at 10,000 feet and looking at the ground coming towards you at an alarmingly fast rate, there is another option.

The Prague Indoor Skydiving Arena, or what is currently called the Hurricane Factory, offers people from the age of 5 the chance to experience a lot of the thrill but without the danger element.

In fact you'll never be more than 14 metres above the ground during this Prague activity but when you've got forced air underneath you blowing at up to 270Km/h it all feels fairly realistic.

The other thing to mention is that skydivers from a plane don't get the opportunity to go up as well as down. Professional trainers, multi-lingual, great fun and super memories.
