Not Better Together

Back in 1991 Czechoslovakia, Poland and Hungary formed an alliance called the Visegrad group (if you know your history then in the year 1335 there was a similar alliance against the Austrians). In 2004 the Visegrad 4 now the Czech Republic, Slovakia, Hungary and Poland all joined the European Union. You could see the sense in a political alliance then but what with the Polish and Hungarian governments trampling on judicial process and blatantly challenging the EU's core values then many in this country including me might be inclined to cut loose some people who still see themselves as being in 1335.

In The News

A sign of the increase in business optimism and a direct impact of the increase in online shopping is that the country is projected to add 1.2 million square metres of what is called "A-Class" (lit and temperature controlled) warehouse space in 2022.

A news item which started in the Ukraine also highlighted the fact that Czech is in the same group including other countries like Romania, Finland and even Germany in that none of these European countries currently have a resident US Ambassador.

In an outbreak of common sense, the newly elected government formally cancelled the previous government's directive to enforce mandatory Covid-19 vaccinations in selected groups. Prime Minister Petr Fiala said that it was clearly stated why people should be vaccinated and there was a danger of continuing social division had they continued on the mandatory course.

The new Czech government is expected to be more pro-Western and more pro-EU than it's predecessor but it has surprised the financial markets. Normally there is an annual reconfirmation of the intention of Czech to take the Euro currency. But in a change, the government stated that it will not adopt the Euro in it's four-year term.

Better late than never i.e. a week before it begins, the Foreign Ministry confirmed that it would join a political boycott of the Beijing winter Olympics so no government freebies on this one.

An addition to the Art Scene in Prague is a lamp at the Municipal Library whose light alternates depending on the level of fake news on Czech websites. Cool!

Trivia and Odd Statistics

Just as a one-off, here are some of the highlights of the first tranche of Czech National Census data taken between March and May 2021 but released on January 14^{th} 2022.

The population of the Czech Republic in May 2021 was officially 10,524,167 which was 87,000 more than 2011.

The national population is divided 50.7% female and 49.3% male.

Compared with the 2011 census there are 195,000 more buildings.

The 2021 census was the first ever that could be completed online and more than 85% of respondents chose this method.

The average age of a Prague resident is 41.4 years.

13.9% of Prague residents did not identify as a Czech citizen.

20.4% of the Czech population is aged 65 or over.

13.3% of females gave their marital status as "widowed" but only 2.9% of men.

Foreigners account for 4.7% of the population, the largest groups being Ukrainian (1.4%), Slovakian (0.9%), Vietnamese (0.5%).

25% of Czech housing was built before 1946.

When asked a voluntary question about Nationality with a defined list of answers 83.8% identified as Czech, 5% Moravian and 0.2% Silesian.

10% of Czechs identified their religion as Roman Catholic.

68.3% of Czechs ticked the box "without religious beliefs".

When given the choice of multiple nationalities, 15,841 people declared they had dual-nationality as Czech/Romany.

Walking Tours

An optimistic beginning to the year as I worked in January and received bookings for tours in February, April, May and June so a better start than last year (my first tour of 2021 was July 5th!!). Normally I don't work in February but this year I've made an exception because basically every little helps and if people want to tour in the coldest month of the year then I'm happy to guide them.

January and February are not peak season here and it's a time when guides often meet up and have a chat because it's difficult to arrange meetings at any other time in a normal year. So my first time meeting with other guides in the city for quite a while confirmed the fact that many have left the tourism industry permanently. Guides under the umbrella of the city tourism office were badly affected but the independent self-employed guides who had no other income were pretty much wiped out. I laugh when I remember the UK recessions of the 80s and how "bad" they were.

Old Town and Jewish Quarter is running normally

<u>City Walking Tour</u> is running normally (if Prague Castle is closed then the route changes to include John Lennon Wall, Our Lady Victorious if open and the riverside plus there will be no tram ride).



World War Two is running normally

Architecture Tour is running normally

Czech Food and Beer Tasting is suspended due to restaurant/bar closures. Option of food/drink is now only on Private Tours.



<u>Christmas Markets</u> has restrictions: "tour-only" in 2022 with time for people to buy food/drink as required.

Activity Spotlight! - Kampa Museum

If you like your contemporary modern art served central-European style then this is a place you'll want to go.

Situated in the Kampa Park alongside the river Vltava in an old mill building on the side of Kampa Island it hosts both its own permanent collection built-up by its patrons over 60 years and other temporary exhibitions.

You can pay to see individual exhibitions or just see them all but what they have in common is the central-European view of modern art. The patrons also seek to promote Czechs forced to emigrate during the communist repression that may not be well known to local Czechs.
