## The House by the Sea

## **In The News**

What's been taking up all the air-time this month.....Postal Ballots. That's right, Czechia currently does not allow postal ballots during an election and there's a big hubbub about "safety and security". The main opposition party that floated the idea 3 years ago (when they were in government) is now in tizzy because the current government wants to introduce it. Pure politics and a waste of parliamentary time as the opposition seeks to delay implementation.

The National Anti-drug Coordinator issued a warning to producers and retail companies selling HHC products (cannabis hemp derivative) in sweets. This is step one in a series that ends with "regulate or we'll do it for you". Currently HHC products are legally sold in Czechia but several EU countries are introducing national bans.

On a 2-day trip to the Plzen region the President got to visit the famous Pilsner Urquell Brewery. He was impressed with actions taken by the brewery to become more sustainable. It was not reported what he had to drink but I think we can all guess.

20 years after joining the European Union, Czechia has still not adopted the Euro as its currency. The government performs its task for discussing this but so far will not set a date for acceptance and hence there is no plan for the 2-year pairing of CZK with Euro which would happen when Czechia entered the Exchange Rate Mechanism. Why no progress? Quite simply it is seen as a vote-loser for the government which is why they fought the last election with a promise that the Euro would not be adopted in this parliament.

The second baby gorilla born in captivity at Prague Zoo was confirmed to be a girl. Children in Cameroon have suggested the potential names and people in Czech will vote for their favourite.

# **Trivia and Odd Statistics**

The leader of the largest Czech opposition party was caught referring to Austrians as "those lunatics". He later clarified he meant that only members of Austria's Green Party were lunatics.

4742 migrants in transit through the country were detained by Czech police in 2023.

# Czech driver Martin Macik won the Truck category of the 2024 Dakar Rally.

A 16<sup>th</sup> Century book of religious texts that went missing from Czechoslovakia in the 1940s has been returned to the Archbishopric of the city of Olomouc. Italian police recovered it at an auction.

# The Prague Vaclav Havel Airport released data showing that it handled 13.8 million travellers in 2023. 78% of the pre-Covid number.

A poll for Czech Radio indicated that 60% of the country would prefer a referendum on whether to accept the Euro rather than leaving it to the government.

# Nationally there were approximately 13.3 million cinema tickets sold in 2023 with the average ticket price CZK170.

Czechia has approximately 82,000 nurses.

# The Budvar brewery produced 1.8 Million Hectolitres of beer in 2023 and will expand to 2.1 Million Hectolitres by 2026.

Czechia exported 12 Terawatts of electricity in 2023.

# Masaryk railway station is planned to provide a public transit from Prague Airport to the centre in 2030.

The "Three Kings" charity drive held every year on January 6<sup>th</sup> raised more than CZK161 Million in 2023.

# **Walking Tours**

### **Tours and Card Payment**

For any Private Tours or for any Scheduled Tours booked directly through a tour calendar, clients can pay the full cost of a tour in advance by card payment with the understanding that refunds are maximum 96% (cost of tour minus any card transaction fee which is out of my control). In this case you first receive a payment request which has to be completed within 48 hours. Then you receive the booking confirmation.

### **Tours and Cash Payment**

If you prefer to pay for a tour either scheduled or private in cash then you need to contact me. We will agree the tour details and I will quote a price in CZK and your own currency equivalent. You will then receive the booking confirmation and payment is made on the tour day at the agreed amount so in this case there is no advance payment and cancellation is free.

Private Tours are arranged as required.

Old Town and Jewish Quarter is running normally.

<u>City Walking Tour</u> is running normally.

World War Two is running normally.

Architecture Tour is running normally.

<u>Czech Food and Beer Tasting</u> is Suspended. The option of food/drink is now only on Private Tours.

<u>Christmas Markets</u> has restrictions: "tour-only" in 2024 with time for people to buy food/drink as required.

## **Activity Spotlight! – Kannastar Cannabis Shop**



Kannastar Cannabis Shop

It's a common question for visitors to Prague i.e. is Cannabis legal here? You have to separate Marijuana from Hemp. All cannabis products for sale in the shops here are hemp-based and stay within the EU rules on product strength. Therefore it's legal to sell it here.

But we have strict laws on possession of cannabis/marijuana which is illegal so you need to know the limit between what's constitutes a fixed penalty fine and what might result in a criminal conviction. Or just don't take the chance.

So this post about going to a shop where you can get great advice, buy cannabis products and ingest them all in the same place so everything is safe and legal.
