Easter Market

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Food and Drink – Vinna Klobasa

On March 1st 2024 the Prague Castle changed it's pricing, route naming and ticket content. It's now much simpler than it was with a choice of either historic buildings "Main Circuit" or the Permanent Exhibition sites plus a couple of single ticket options. The Main Circuit ticket adult price increased from CZK250 to CZK450. <u>Read more....</u>

Realistic Pricing

Since the pandemic there has been a steady increase in prices across the board but in 2023 I began to notice the "tourism" increases. I was in Valencia last October visiting the ST Nicola Di Bari church and they charged 10 Euros (CZK250). I commented to my wife that this was the same price to explore all the historic buildings at Prague Castle. In 2024 the Castle increased it's main ticket price to CZK450. Where entry prices have increased you should bear in mind that these are still excellent value compared with other European capitals.

Study and Learn

Czechia joined the Erasmus study exchange program 30 years ago and more than 400,000 Czechs have taken advantage of being able to study abroad. This will have given their parents and grandparents a feeling of pride and/or regret at not having been able to do the same under communist repression. I also read that more than 118,000 people came to Czechia to study. Although these people are generally university students, the Erasmus program is open to high-school students, teachers and other educational professionals. Czechia is historically a very literate country that has always encouraged educational improvement and cultural understanding. What opportunities and what memories this scheme brings.

In The News

The "Vyšehrad 4" is a political block that includes Czechia, Poland, Hungary and Slovakia. At a recent meeting in Prague, all countries agreed that "Russia's aggression against Ukraine is in violation of international law and Ukrainian territory must remain within internationally recognised borders". At the same meeting, Poland and Czechia agreed to finance and supply artillery shells for Ukraine but Hungary and Slovakia said that they had no intention of backing that plan. Fortunately, we don't need their permission....

Like several European countries the farmers were protesting. A lot of it was about resistance to the "Green Deal" which will affect subsidies. I support farmers. Anybody that knows how to grow food has to be respected. I don't even mind if they get benefits for growing certain crops to make it profitable etc. What I don't support is getting subsidies for not growing certain crops.

It was reported that the Institute for the Study of Totalitarian Regimes issued a list of people who had fairly high ranking positions in the Communist era with the intention of reducing their pensions. When the figure was published it said that if these people had pensions over CZK18,674 per month then it would be reduced by CZK300 per month. Do the math and it means an annual pension of one of these communist era people who served 10 years in office reduces by CZK3600 per year or roughly the same as filling your car with fuel twice. Not exactly a punishment!

The Foreign Ministry issued a travel advisory notice for Czechs travelling to France. It said that travellers "should keep an eye on their luggage and report suspicious people". So, no change there then!

Trivia and Odd Statistics

More than 600,000 tourists visited the Plzenske Prazdroj (Pilsner Urquell Brewery) in 2023.

411,000 Czechs have participated in the Erasmus exchange program in the past 25 years.

85 years ago, Czechs started driving on the right side of the road.

Since the Przewalski horse breed became extinct in the wild in Mongolia in the 1960s, Prague Zoo has bred and sent to the country 38 horses for breeding in a nature reserve.

The Dukla Praha Football team coach Petr Rada was banned from attending matches for 8 months and fined CZK80,000 for calling an opposing team coach a "desperate gypsy".

517 libraries and 616 schools participated in the 20th anniversary of the "Night with Anderson" which promotes reading for young people.

In 2023, health researchers collected more than 3000 ticks from city parks around Czechia and of the 2100 tested, 1 in 4 had Lyme disease.

The first Skoda car, the Skoda 1000MB, was unveiled 60 years ago.

Medal winners at the Ice Hockey World Championships to be held in Czechia in May will receive medals from Czech crystal made to look like ice with skate marks and encased in Gold, Silver and Bronze.

Prague's Vaclav Havel Airport will offer 167 destinations in 2024.

According to to the government, 35 Czech soldiers are allowed to be in Ukraine either to protect the embassy or investigate military crimes.

The overnight train between Prague and Brussels takes 15 hours.

Walking Tours

Well it was not a warm March so the sun cream stayed in it's bottle. As I write this, Easter will be celebrated this weekend but the Easter markets have already been going on for two weeks.

April is the official start of the summer season. It sees the reopening of the parks and gardens that have been closed for the last four months and you'll find closing times for attractions will be later than in the winter. River traffic significantly increases now both with the larger cruiser boats and individuals using the river for boating, paddling and rafting.

Tours and Card Payment

For any Private Tours or for any Scheduled Tours booked directly through a tour calendar, clients can pay the full cost of a tour in advance by card payment with the understanding that refunds are maximum 96% (cost of tour minus any card transaction fee which is out of my control). In this case you first receive a payment request which has to be completed within 48 hours. Then you receive the booking confirmation.

Tours and Cash Payment

If you prefer to pay for a tour either scheduled or private in cash then you need to contact me. We will agree the tour details and I will quote a price in CZK and your own currency equivalent. You will then receive the booking confirmation and payment is made on the tour day at the agreed amount so in this case there is no advance payment and cancellation is free.

City Walking Tour is running normally.

World War Two is running normally.

Architecture Tour is running normally.

<u>Czech Food and Beer Tasting</u> is Suspended. The option of food/drink is now only on Private Tours.

<u>Christmas Markets</u> has restrictions: "tour-only" in 2024 with time for people to buy food/drink as required.

Lucerna Music Bar

Hugely popular for it's Fridays and Saturdays where it plays music and videos from the 80s and 90s it is also a location for regular band gigs.

Throughout the year you'll find a succession of bands both national and international who appreciate the 1500 capacity and the intimacy with the crowd that brings. If a band is in it for the money then there's always the O2 Arena but if they have a choice, they'll perform here.

Split over two basement levels in a very historic building, their associated bar/cafe opens until 3am on the most popular nights. Pay in advance for bands but pay at the door on Friday/Saturday for the 80s and 90s nights (which, by the way, are the only nights you can dance on the stage!).
