Live and Learn

I like to think I am observant. I like to think that in an emergency I could help. A recent event has caused me to redouble my efforts to be aware of my environment as I use the city. In August a blind man fell onto the tracks at the Krizikova station as a metro was still 2 minutes away from the platform. He was killed. People thought the only thing they could do was to call police or wave to the driver to stop but there was another option. A quick poll said 84% of passengers (and I'm included) were not aware of an emergency stop button which would prevent a metro from entering the station if necessary. The next post I wrote on this website told you what to do to activate this system.

EV Time?

I was randomly scrolling through newsletters looking for juicy bits of statistical data when it jumped out at me that there had been an increase of 44% of people buying an electric car in 2024. Wow! I thought until I then read that passenger EVs now account for just 3.65% of the Czech vehicle market. I see more and more people outside of Prague adding solar panels and car charging equipment and there are some incentives around for this ancillary part. But the government isn't exactly blazing a trail to get people buying the actual cars. There seems to be more effort into what they call City Electric which is basically another name for Hybrid (which has 22.1% of the market).

In The News

Lukáš Slavík, a Czech National living in Zimbabwe recently filmed the aftermath of a car crash in which he mentioned that it's fairly common along with power cuts, lack of water and high consumer prices. The authorities arrested him and charged him with spreading false information and incitement of the public. At court the proceedings were rescheduled to to "administrative reasons". There was a power cut at the courthouse!

The Ministry of Defence is redefining what is "medical fitness" for a soldier. In new rules being introduced, "medically fit" may only require you to competently handle a firearm and be able to carry a load of 5Kg. Of course this depends on the role required so I don't expect the Special Forces are going to be inundated with applications!

The Ministry of Health is preparing a law which would effectively ban sweet-flavoured vape products. The current decree states that only one flavour will be allowed.....Tobacco. The Head of the "Chamber for Electronic Vaping" said it would mean the end of vaping in Czechia. I didn't like breathing secondhand strawberry smoke anyway!

The Ministry of Health reported that more than 200 Ukrainian Doctors and Dentists had passed proficiency and linguistic tests to be able to work in Czechia. They also reported that almost another 300 were still in the approval process.

The Ministry of the Interior reported extra police protection for venues during the Prague Pride week following a thwarted attempt to kill festival-goers in Slovakia the previous week. As it turned out the whole week passed without incident and I can say without fear of contradiction that there was more danger of being hugged to death during the Saturday Rainbow Parade.

Trivia and Odd Statistics

The last Education Ministry Mathematics Olympiad attracted more that 22,000 entrants.

Czechia finished 28th in the Paris Olympic Games medal table with 5 medals (although three of them were gold).

A CVVM survey found that 60% of Czechs felt they could influence issues at local government level but less than 25% felt they could influence national government.

In the first half of 2024, farmers reported 177 wolf attacks on livestock.

Czechia has approximately 6000 forensic experts.

The Department for Gender Equality says that 1 in 3 women and 1 in 10 men have experienced sexual harassment on public transport.

In the first half of 2024, electricity consumption fell by 2.3% and gas consumption fell by 7.9% compared with the same period in 2023.

The top destination from Vaclav Havel International airport is Greece.

20% of Czech retirees collect their pension from a post office rather than having it paid directly to a bank account.

A joint survey by the Institute of Sociology and the Academy of Science says that 88% of Czechs view a pub/bar as a vital social hub. The study also found that more men visit pubs than women. Who knew!

The Ministry of Foreign Affairs reports that there are 84 Czech citizens living in Lebanon.

The average daily temperature in July 2024 was 19.8 degrees Celsius making it the 7th warmest month since records began.

In 2024, approximately 20 pairs of Peregrine Falcons nesting in the Jeseniky Mountains bred 32 chicks.


Walking Tours

People often ask me when is the best time to visit Prague and I'll always say September. A pleasantly warm month with lots to do and see in the city and as we pass the peak of tourism in the city you'll find less visitors so in general there's less queuing and more places available across the city tourism activities. Just remember that the 28th is a State Holiday here so although tourism is unaffected, you'll find local business closures. I do fewer tours for families because in general the kids have gone back to school. I had a "small world" experience last month. Chatting with a guy and his two sons during a tour, we realised that we had been born in the same hospital.

People might be interested to know that despite the Covid-19 pandemic and the high rates of inflation since then, my scheduled tour prices have stayed the same.

Tours and Card Payment

For any Private Tours or for any Scheduled Tours booked directly through a tour calendar, clients can pay the full cost of a tour in advance by card payment with the understanding that refunds are maximum 96% (cost of tour minus any card transaction fee which is out of my control). In this case you first receive a payment request which has to be completed within 48 hours. Then you receive the booking confirmation.

Tours and Cash Payment

If you prefer to pay for a tour either scheduled or private in cash then you need to contact me. We will agree the tour details and I will quote a price in CZK and your own currency equivalent. You will then receive the booking confirmation and payment is made on the tour day at the agreed amount so in this case there is no advance payment and cancellation is free.

Tours:

Private Tours are arranged as required.

Old Town and Jewish Quarter is running normally.

<u>City Walking Tour</u> is running normally.

World War Two is running normally.

Architecture Tour is running normally.

<u>Czech Food and Beer Tasting</u> is Suspended. The option of food/drink is now only on Private Tours.

<u>Christmas Markets</u> has restrictions: "tour-only" in 2024 with time for people to buy food/drink as required.

Shooters Island – CoCo Van Cafe

September is the last decent month for visiting Shooters Island and there are several reasons to visit.

If you've got young kids then you'll be coming here with bread for feeding the ducks and carrots for feeding the nutria. Don't feed the young swans in September because the adult swans are very protective. There's the CoCo Van cafe for drink/snacks and a rope playground to burn some energy.

Young adults will be visiting Shooters Island for the free evening music and reasonably cheap beer from the Stage Bar. People looking for a riverside scenic restaurant visit here to eat at Strelecky Ostrov Restaurant and in general you have scenic views on all sides of the island.
