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

## No Hanging About

When I think about how often my mum was waiting on the phone to the doctor trying to get an appointment for a month later if she was lucky etc she was always amazed how it was here. For example I needed a bit of emergency care last month. That took less than 90 minutes including the trip to hospital and stopping at the chemist. I phoned my doctor and got an appointment for three days later. We decided to turn that visit into a general health check so height/weight/eyesight/ECG. Then she signed off on a range of blood tests plus the bowel cancer check. I had those done on the following Tuesday and back to the doctor on Thursday for results (clear) and prescription (which was free).

## Call to Arms

I noticed that Athletico Madrid were playing Sparta Prague this week. I noticed this because of the hundreds of Spanish supporters in the cafes during the day. Not beer drinkers I guess. I saw one extra police van on the Old Town Square and nobody was wearing riot gear. Contrast that to early in October when Dutch team Ajax played Sparta Prague. The beer was flowing freely and you could have walked from one side of the Old Town Square to the other by stepping on armoured police vans. The Tyn courtyard was almost a no-go area and the local police looked like they were extras in a Robocop film. By the way, Sparta lost 6-0 but the whole crowd clapped for Athletico because of the great football they played in the second half.

## In The News

The Ministry of Health announced that from April 1<sup>st</sup> 2025, doctors would be able to prescribe medical cannabis to patients with chronic pain. Of course this will again open up discussion about the role of cannabis (hemp-based) for it's medicinal purposes and I expect this will quickly move to the "let them grow their own" conversation which has not been in the news since the Pirates left the current government.

Since 1922, this country has allowed children aged under three to be cared for "en-masse" in state care institutions. According to EU policy and signed-off by the Czech government, "en-masse" care is now illegal and they have until January 2025 to move the last 40 or so children either to extended family members, foster parents or specialist care.

Oops! The current Premier Petr Fiala, whilst laying some groundwork for seeking another 4-year term, mentioned that his aim was to increase average Czech wages to be in line with German wages. Considering the average German wage is more than double the Czech level, at best I guess you could call this an aspirational target and completely unrealistic in such a short time. Unless he thinks that German wages are about to be cut by 50%!!

The fallout from the September floods just keeps on going. At the current estimate (and this will grow) Insurers are dealing with close to 90,000 claims. Commercial and residential claims are more than CZK18 Billion and the cost to infrastructure brings the total cost of the flood damage to CZK60 Billion. To put that in perspective, the 2025/26 budget deficit for the entire country is CZK241 Billion. So it's the old question, pay to prevent or pay to repair. I think I know what the 17 people who died in the flood would have said.

## **Trivia and Odd Statistics**

The Czech President's annual salary is currently CZK341,200.

Czechia has budgeted CZK104 Million to fund domestic food banks in 2025, a 10% rise on 2024.

Almost 900 people in Czechia received an organ transplant in 2023.

Czechia hosts more Ukrainian refugees per capita than any other country with approximately 7% of displaced Ukrainians or 32.9 refugees per 1000 inhabitants.

November 4<sup>th</sup> marked 20 years since the end of Military conscription.

Following the September floods, the Czech army has rebuilt 19 road bridges.

A Czechoslovak CZK5000 banknote issued in 1919 sold at auction for CZK25.68 Million. Only 3 are known to exist and even the Czech National Bank does not own one.

The Czech Labour Office said that at the end of July 2024 there were 827,600 foreign workers in Czechia.

The Czech government is currently defining in law what is an "energy drink" so it can be banned from sale to children under 15.

The skeletal remains of WW2 US Pilot William L. Kiggins were handed over to the US Ambassador for repatriation.

A fire at the National Theatre on November 27<sup>th</sup> caused damage estimated at CZK10 Million.

Of the 34 countries that participated in the International Computer and Information Literacy Study (ICILS), Czechia ranked second (South Korea was first).

A Rufous rat-kangaroo was born at the Olomouc Zoo.

# **Walking Tours**

We've already had the first snow of the season but in general it feels warmer than usual. My little late-November break is over and I now launch into the Christmas period. The way the dates have worked out it will be a 6-week celebration of the season with accompanying food and drink. My tour clients still request regular city tours but until December 23<sup>rd</sup> they'll have the opportunity to learn the tips and tricks in the markets plus all our Christmas Traditions in the Advent period. I still favour the smaller/cheaper market at Republic Square but I always make sure my tour clients get to see the Old Town Square Christmas Tree sound and light show plus a few details about the tree.

People might be interested to know that despite the Covid-19 pandemic and the high rates of inflation since then, my scheduled tour prices have stayed the same.

I did three tours with Jason, this one, the architecture tour and one private. Travelling solo, however, makes that difficult because with large companies you often have to pay far more because if they don't get the numbers, they charge you for more than one person. ### **Tours and Card Payment**

For any Private Tours or for any Scheduled Tours booked directly through a tour calendar, clients can pay the full cost of a tour in advance by card payment with the understanding that refunds are maximum 96% (cost of tour minus any card transaction fee which is out of my control). In this case you first receive a payment request which has to be completed within 48 hours. Then you receive the booking confirmation.

### **Tours and Cash Payment**

If you prefer to pay for a tour either scheduled or private in cash then you need to contact me. We will agree the tour details and I will quote a price in CZK and your own currency equivalent. You will then receive the booking confirmation and payment is made on the tour day at the agreed amount so in this case there is no advance payment and cancellation is free.

#### **Tours:**

Private Tours are arranged as required.

Old Town and Jewish Quarter is running normally.

City Walking Tour is running normally.

World War Two is running normally.

<u>Architecture Tour</u> is running normally.

<u>Czech Food and Beer Tasting</u> is Suspended. The option of food/drink is now only on Private Tours.

<u>Christmas Markets</u> has restrictions: "tour-only" in 2024 with time for people to buy food/drink as required.
