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

## Whiners

For years I watched bottles of wine being given as corporate gifts and the companies involved regularly trotted out their spokespeople to declare their support for the Czech wine industry. Fast forward to 2023 and the government removed the tax-free status of wine as a corporate gift. In 2024 70% of wine growers in Czechia reported a drop in income despite a very high quality harvest. It seems that corporate Czechia supports the wine industry, but only if it's tax free!

## Deal or no Deal

The "Green Deal" in Europe is in the news fairly often. Used on one side to prod government and energy providers to undergo significant changes to reduce carbon emissions and use of fossil fuels. However, to maintain their profit margins, these providers then fight back by asking for a lot of money to offset these changes which then works it's way down to the consumer who ultimately will pay more. So are we paying more for a better world or maintaining company finance. You may not have noticed but huge strides have been made to improve air quality in Czechia over the last 30 years. All those brown coal apartment furnaces are now gone. That blanket of smog over Prague in the winter is largely gone. The Green Deal is just another step. But maybe the name is wrong. Maybe it should have been the "Making Sure That Your Grandchildren Have A Better Quality of Life and Don't Have to Suffer Extreme Climatic Events Deal". Not so snappy but, maybe more accurate.

### In The News

The unemployment figure for December 2024 was 4.1% but this is just an average. I noticed that when broken down into country regions, my own area "Prague-east" had an unemployment rate of just 1.5%. To put that in perspective, for every job advertised in this area there are 0.3 people responding. Like not even a whole person is applying. Companies must be pessimistic about being able to hire quality staff.

It's official. The Constitutional Court ruled that the courtyards of Prague Castle are not public spaces and that their use falls under the jurisdiction of the Prague Castle Administration.

To nobody's surprise, the government published figures that showed the effect of widespread low temperatures and frost that affected the country in April 2024. The overall fruit production of the country fell by 65%. Production of apples fell by 68%, plums fell by 62% and cherries by 76%. The government allocated CZK445 million in a compensation scheme to offset the losses of producers.

Czech Railways delivered some festive cheer. They reported an increase of 2.5% in train travel meaning that they carried 168.45 million passengers in 2024. They combined their report with an upgrade in rolling stock of 144 trains and engines worth a combined CZK19 billion. 87.6% of services ran on time.

The decision of Prague authorities to crack down on businesses that expand their premesis using external covered areas was in the news. It's not just the potential illegal use of the extra land, it brings safety factors like when gas space heaters are used. This was brought sharply into the news when six people were killed this week in one of these extensions in a restaurant in the town of Most.

## Trivia and Odd Statistics

In November 2024 electricity prices and rent prices increased while fuel and gas prices decreased.

A survey by Provident Financial indicated that 23% of employed Czechs are expecting a pay rise in 2025.

In the 2024 annual bird census, 35,000 participants observed 792,000 birds.

The 30<sup>th</sup> edition of the Czech Press Photo competition was won by Associated Press photographer Petr David Josek.

In 2024, 92,217 traffic accidents were reported to Police. 1,609 people suffered life-threatening injuries of which 438 people died, the lowest death total since 1961.

The biggest exporters of beer to Russia are Czechia and Germany.

In 2024, just over 4 million people visited the 100+ cultural sites (churches, monasteries, castles, chateaus etc) controlled by the National Heritage Institute. This is 20% less than pre-covid level.

A variable speed limit to be introduced on parts of the new D3 motorway will mean cars can travel up to 150Kmh or 93Mph.

The monthly minimum wage is CZK20,800.

The Czech National Bank bought 20.5 tons of gold in 2024.

From September 2027 schools will be required to teach English as the first "foreign" language from 1<sup>st</sup> grade.

Czech delivery company Zasilkovna calculated that it had processed 1.1 million packages in one day, 16<sup>th</sup> December 2024.

Six comets have been discovered by Czech or Czechoslovak astronomers in the last 50 years.


# **Walking Tours**

Historically the coldest month of the year and the least pleasant for showing people around the city. I generally take part of the month off to find some winter sun so I'm charged back up and ready for the Spring. People still come to Prague but in general there's not enough business for me to offer scheduled tours. If people contact me I'm happy to recommend options for private tours. If visiting in February make sure you've got proper footwear to separate you from the cold ground. Hats and gloves are a must and if you feel the cold invest in some kind of hand warmer.

People might be interested to know that despite the Covid-19 pandemic and the high rates of inflation since then, my scheduled tour prices have stayed the same.

#### **Review**

I picked out the review from "anncam4127". The Christmas Markets tour is based around two things. First it's learning about the Czech Christmas traditions like festivals, what we eat, when we do certain tasks, what we can/can't do, superstitions and generally how we celebrate. The other part is understanding the markets, getting a LOT of local tips for how best to enjoy them plus some specific places to try.



### **Gift Vouchers**

Read about the Gift Voucher system on the <u>Gift Voucher page</u>. You can buy individual tours as a gift for somebody and by contacting me the recipient of the gift will have options to swap tours or use the credit to upgrade to a private tour etc. Vouchers are valid for 1 year.

### **Tours and Card Payment**

For any Private Tours or for any Scheduled Tours booked directly through a tour calendar, clients can pay the full cost of a tour in advance by card payment with the understanding that refunds are maximum 96% (cost of tour minus any card transaction fee which is out of my control). In this case you first receive a payment request which has to be completed within 48 hours. Then you receive the booking confirmation.

### **Tours and Cash Payment**

If you prefer to pay for a tour either scheduled or private in cash then you need to contact me. We will agree the tour details and I will quote a price in CZK and your own currency equivalent. You will then receive the booking confirmation and payment is made on the tour day at the agreed amount so in this case there is no advance payment and cancellation is free.

#### **Tours:**

Private Tours are arranged as required.

Old Town and Jewish Quarter is running normally.

**City Walking Tour** is running normally.

World War Two is running normally.

<u>Architecture Tour</u> is running normally.

<u>Czech Food and Beer Tasting</u> is Suspended. The option of food/drink is now only on Private Tours.

<u>Christmas Markets</u> has restrictions: "tour-only" in 2025 with time for people to buy food/drink as required.





## **Activity Spotlight! – Communism Museum**



Museum of Communism

February is most definitely the month for visiting museums especially if you feel the cold.

The Museum of Communism is a place to go to begin to understand the effect that communism had on the country. The museum is laid out in a clear timeline so you can see events from the post-war election of 1946 right through to the fall of communist rule in 1989.

The Museum is sectioned into various parts, some deal with the politics, there's an interesting area where it discusses the replacement of the currency, there's a big sections that describe the importance of sport and nationalist art etc. Of course there are darker parts of the museum which deal with persecution and often, execution of Czechs but it ends with the Velvet Revolution (and associated video).
